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## Mary and the Beloved Disciple at the Cross: 19:25-27

<sup>25</sup> Meanwhile, standing near the cross of Jesus were his mother, and his mother's sister, Mary the wife of Clopas, and Mary Magdalene.
<sup>26</sup> When Jesus saw his mother and the disciple whom he loved

standing beside her, he said to his mother, "Woman, here is your son." <sup>27</sup> Then he said to the disciple, "Here is your mother." And from that hour the disciple took her into his own home.






How many Marys were there at the foot of the cross?

Could the Beloved Disciple who took Mary home have been, perhaps, Mary Magdalene?









